1a Our Goals for Student Achievement

DISTRICT GOALS

- Increase the percentage of students meeting or exceeding grade-level standards in reading and math.
- Reduce chronic absenteeism across all schools.
- Ensure equitable academic growth across all student subgroups.

SCHOOL GOALS

- All students will show strong academic growth, including progress on personal goals for students with disabilities and language growth for English learners.
- 80% of students will demonstrate growth in social-emotional competencies (self-awareness, self-management, responsible decision-making, relationship skills, and social awareness).

2 AT HOME

- Ensure students attend school daily, arrive on time, and are ready to learn.
- Read with children at least 20 minutes a day and encourage practice of math and problem-solving skills at home.
- Attend family engagement events and maintain communication with teachers and staff.
- Support school expectations for behavior, respect, and community service.
