

## Our Goals for Student Achievement

#### **DISTRICT GOALS**

- Increase the percentage of students meeting or exceeding grade-level standards in reading and math.
- Reduce chronic absenteeism across all schools.
- Ensure equitable academic growth across all student subgroups.

## **STUDENTS**

- Come to school ready to learn and try their best every day.
- Follow classroom and school rules, showing respect for themselves and others.
- Share what they are learning with their families.
- Take responsibility for their learning by asking for help when needed and setting personal goals.

- Provide high-quality Montessori and standards-aligned instruction in a safe and caring environment.
- Share student progress regularly through report cards, progress reports, conferences, and NWEA MAP updates.
- Offer family workshops such as Literacy Night, Math & Science Night, and Parent Council meetings to help families support learning at home.

## AT HOME

- Ensure students attend school daily, arrive on time, and are ready to learn.
- Read with children at least 20 minutes a day and encourage practice of math and problemsolving skills at home.
- Attend family engagement events and maintain communication with teachers and staff.
- Support school expectations for behavior, respect, and community service.
